LUCIADAGEN

December 13 is Luciadagen, or St. Lucia's Day. For Swedes it is the beginning of the holiday season. The Swedish traditional story is acted out in homes, churches, and other locations around the world. While most would associate the custom with the Nordic countries, as Swedes have moved around the world the tradition continues to be celebrated even in places that haven't experienced winter, such as the Republic of the Congo. The story is acted out with the oldest daughter playing Lucia. Early in the morning she brings her parents a tray of sweet saffron buns and some coffee. She wears a white gown and a crown of greens, often made of holly. Her sisters and brothers dress in white and follow her. The girls carry lit candles and the boys wear tall, pointed caps and are called "star boys." The tradition at Old Swedes has been carried out since 1938.

According to Wikipedia, some people trace the 're-birth' of the Lucia celebrations in Sweden "to the tradition in German Protestant families of having girls dressed as angelic Christ children, handing out Christmas presents." The Swedish variant of this white-dressed "Kindchen Jesus", or Christkind, was called "Kinken Jes", and started to appear in upper-class

families in the 1700s on Christmas Eve with a candle-wreath in her hair, handing out candy and cakes to the children. Others say the Lucia celebration evolved from old Swedish traditions of star boys and white-dressed angels singing Christmas carols at different events during Advent and Christmas. In either case, the current tradition of having a white-dressed lady with candles in her hair appearing on Lucia day started in the late 1700s and spread slowly to other parts of the country during the 1800s.

Regardless of the origin of Lucia those who are familiar with the song 'Sankta Lucia' will tell a different story. The English translation of the Swedish song includes the words 'There in our dark house, appears with lighted candles Saint Lucia, Saint Lucia.' Yet the Italian version of the song says 'Come to my quick little boat! Santa Lucia! Santa Lucia!' It talks about the place Saint Lucia on the Bay of Naples.

This year lets enjoy the 70th local celebration of the Swedish Yule, Luciadagen, or Saint Lucy's Day.

Guatemala Outreach

Six years ago Gloria Dei joined other churches in the diocese and elected to begin a companion relationship with two small Episcopal parishes in Guatemala. After discussion and a visit from Marben Juarez, the lay pastor of these two parishes, we decided that sending scholarship money to students whose families struggled financially to send them to school would be the best way to help our sister parishes.

In 2002, four members of the Guatemala committee went to visit the people of Anunciation and Acension. While we were there we noticed a little boy who sat apart from the others, who kept rubbing his red eye. It turned out he had pink eye, a condition that is easily treatable if there is access to medicine. But the people of Acension lived up a bumpy dirt road on an isolated hill. To get to a doctor, a sick person had to walk for about an hour to reach the highway and then wait for a bus to take them into the nearest town. We started wondering how much it would cost for a doctor to come and give the children a checkup once a month and provide vitamins and medicine where needed. After discussion with Marben and with the vestry, we decided to send additional money to provide for periodic medical visits.

In addition to the money for scholarship and medical care, Gloria Dei has generously given money for individuals in need of help traveling to Guatemala City for medical care and to help replace the decrepit motor cycle that Marben used to travel back and forth between his two parishes.

To raise money for these projects, we have sold Guatemalan crafts and asked members of the parish to sponsor children who need scholarships. The Sunday School children have raised hundreds of dollars for the children in our sister parishes and sponsor one or two scholarships every year. They have written letters, drawn pictures and sent presents down on our visits to Guatemala.

These are only some of the many activities and projects that members of Gloria Dei have given their heart and energy to. I have been proud to be part of it and hope that our love for our sister parishes and the gifts we give will continue for a long time. I also wish that everyone at Gloria Dei could

experience the personal relationships that I have been able to have with members of these parishes as well as other people in the Diocese of Guatemala. It has been one of the great adventures of my life to know these people personally.

In order to continue this relationship we need more volunteers to join the Guatemala Committee. The Guatemala Committee is responsible for organizing the annual scholarship drive, proposing a budget to vestry, and facilitating communication between our churches in Guatemala and the members of Gloria Dei. In the past there has been wonderful support from the whole parish in these activities, but a strong committee is needed to organize and lead the effort.

Although I intend to remain on the Guatemala Committee, I think it is time that I stepped down as chair. It is time for the new energy and new ideas that a new chair would bring. I hope someone from the parish will feel called to step forward and lead us on in our continuing relationship with the people of Anunciation and Asencion. I hope that others will feel called to serve on the committee so that we can continue this wonderful ministry.

STANDING NOTICES

Weddings

Weddings at Gloria Dei (Old Swedes') Church must be scheduled with the clergy at least three months in advance. All weddings in the church will be governed by the Canons of the Diocese of Pennsylvania and the Book of Common Prayer. Pre-marital counseling is a prerequisite. No weddings will be conducted during Lent.

Funeral

When death occurs a family member is asked to contact the clergy so that timely arrangements for a funeral may be made. It is appropriate for the funeral of a Christian to take place in the church. It is also appropriate that funeral arrangements be made in advance and kept in a file in the church office. Burial plots are available for members of the parish in the church's cemetery. Consult the church office for costs and details.

Baptisms

The sacrament of Holy Baptism is celebrated during one of the principle Sunday liturgies and is governed by the Canons of the church and the Book of Common Prayer. Baptism is normally celebrated on one of the four appropriate feast days designated in the Book of Common Prayer. These are: The Baptism of our Lord (1/13/07); The Great Vigil of Easter (4/7/07); Pentecost (5/27/07); and All Saints Sunday (11/4/07). Other Sundays may be chosen, if necessary, with the advise of the clergy. Baptism instruction will be provided for parents and godparents beforehand.
