New Designs for A New People

As I was flying home from a visit with my brother and sister-in-law a week ago I was thumbing through one of those "In Flight" magazines you find in the seat pocket in front of you. I came to the page where you find diagrams of other airports. I think they supply these diagrams to help passengers orient themselves when making connecting flights. I was struck by the many and varied designs of airports. The twelve that were presented on the pages I found

had nothing similar about them. They were as different as I imagine you would find if you put twelve 3rd graders to the task of drawing their ideas of an ideal airport. Yet, I know there are any number of engineers and designers out there who, you would think, might have come together with a design that works best for what are the pretty standard needs of an airport, whether in New York or New Delhi.

I considered that perhaps there are geographical reasons for the extreme differences, but that doesn't really hold water. I'm not talking about the runways here but the terminals: the places where people come together to travel, with or without baggage, to various places around the country and

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around the world. Their needs are, if not always the same, certainly very similar. Good signage, a way to get from check-in to boarding gate, food and restrooms in accessible places, and places to gather to wait.

As I stared at the diagrams I began to see what I thought might be cultural, not engineering, differences. And I found that thought provoking. Why, for instance, with the same amount of geographical space available, did the Atlanta airport choose to design long, straight terminals, separated from each other in such a way that an underground train is necessary to get from one terminal to the another, while the Houston and Paris airports, just as large if not larger,

seemed to make a concerted effort to create central places where people could gather and from which they could move out, like spokes on a wheel, to their boarding gates when the time came?

Maybe I was just suffering some travel lag, but I nonetheless brought the diagrams back with me and have been staring at them, trying to figure out what



about the multi-faceted possibilities of airport design attracted my attention. I think it may say something about how we design our lives and the choices we make to be with, or be apart from, those with whom we share the spaces in our lives.

It has become an obvious fact that we live now in a global


community. What will be our reactions as we become more and more aware of this? Will we try to move away, move apart, from community when that community takes on a new way of handling its responsibilities? Will we see why the differences matter? Or will we seek out those places where we are most comfortable, where we can find our way to the familiar and avoid the unfamiliar.

And might we consider these things on another level. A people level. Who do we keep separate from? Who makes us feel uncomfortable or confused or threatened? What is the pattern of people in our lives and how do we move through our lives – in straight lines, divided by clear boundaries or wading head first into the sea of people journeying through life, moving from place to place with confidence that the globe, or the airport, can not only accommodate us but can help us to grow into new designs for a new creation?

Look at the designs. What do you see?

Arvid Hernbom Lay Reader 1719

A small plaque on the back of a pew at the front of the church peaked our curiosity this month. Arvid Hernbom, Lay Reader 1719. Who was he?

Arvid Hernbom, who served as chaplain at the Swedish embassy, came to America around 1719. He was licensed to preach by Bishop Jesper Swedberg. Swedberg, who was one of Sweden's most notable churchmen, had ordered Rev. Andreas Sandel to ordain Arvid Hernbom to the priesthood to serve the Wicaco congregation after Sandel's departure.

But, after his arrival, Sandel and the other Swedish clergymen did not think he was qualified for the priesthood and he was not ordained. In 1719, on Sandel's departure, Hernbom was promised 25L (pounds) a year to preach part time at Wicaco. After Sandel's departure Arvid Hernbom alternated for a time with Rev. Hesselius, of Christina Church, and the Rev. Lidenius, pastor of Racoon Church, in New Jersey. These clergymen promised to perform divine service once a month. During the vacancy Hernbom maintained the church school and when the ministers weren't available served as a lay-reader.

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

The Book Club at Old Swedes


Meeting: November 24th, 6:30 PM

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STANDING NOTICES

Weddings

Weddings at Gloria Dei (Old Swedes') Church must be scheduled with the clergy at least three months in advance. All weddings in the church will be governed by the Canons of the Diocese of Pennsylvania and the Book of Common Prayer. Pre-marital counseling is a prerequisite. No weddings will be conducted during Lent.

Funerals

When death occurs a family member is asked to contact the clergy so that timely arrangements for a funeral may be made. It is appropriate for the funeral of a Christian to take place in the church. It is also appropriate that funeral arrangements be made in advance and kept in a file in the church office. Burial plots are available for members of the parish in the church's cemetery. Consult the church office for costs and details.

Baptisms

The sacrament of Holy Baptism is celebrated during one of the principle Sunday liturgies and is governed by the Canons of the church and the Book of Common Prayer. Baptism is normally celebrated on one of the four appropriate feast days designated in the Book of Common Prayer. These are: The Baptism of our Lord (1/11/09); The Great Vigil of Easter (4/12/09); Pentecost (5/31/09); and All Saints Sunday (11/1/09). Other Sundays may be chosen, if necessary, with the advise of the clergy. Baptism instruction will be provided for parents and godparents beforehand.
